## 'Degazetting Selangor forest will derail Malaysia's carbon goals'

KUALA LUMPUR: The degazette-ment of the Kuala Langat North Forest Reserve (KLNFR) or any other reserve in the country would derail Malaysia's carbon intensity reduction target that was present-ed to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC).

Environment and Water Minister Datuk Seri Tuan Ibrahim Tuan Man said the target would be derailed if Selangor continued with its plan to degazette the KLNFR

for redevelopment.
"The degazettement of KLNFR

or other forest reserves will impact the target of 45 per cent carbon intensity reduction by 2030 under the nation's Nationally Determined Contribution presented to the UNFCCC this year.
"I support the statement by the

energy and natural resources min-ister (Datuk Seri Takiyuddin Hassan), who disagreed with Selan-gor's proposal to degazette the KL-NFR," he said yesterday. Takiyuddin had said the fed-eral government objected to Se-

langor's move to degazette 500ha

On Aug 30, Selangor Tourism, Environment, Green Technology and Orang Asli committee chair-man Hee Loy Sian told the State Legislative Assembly that the state had degazetted 536.7ha of the KL-NFR slated for development under Section 13 of the Nethanal Forester Section 12 of the National Forestry Act (Adoption) Enactment 1985.

Hee said it was approved during a state executive council meeting on May 5 and validated in another

Ibrahim said the Department of Environment (DoE) had yet to re-ceive an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) report for the

plan.

He was referring to the stop-work order issued by the DoE to the Selangor State Agriculture Corporation in April over forest clearing it carried out for a pro-posed oil palm plantation before

an EIA was submitted.

"Any decision on whether development at the Sungai Panjang Forest Reserve should continue is subject to the EIA. The ministry is ready to hold consultations with Selangor to find the best so-

lution to this issue.
"The ministry's priority is to ensure every development project is sustainable."
